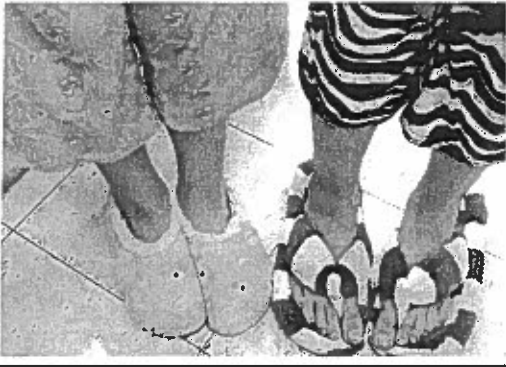


NEWS you need to know

CURRICULUM counts!

Grade 4

Fourth grade science classes are creating and observing the effects of water on land using their stream table in the Land and Water unit. Students work in cooperative groups sharing responsibilities while employing the scientific method to conduct experiments.

In reading, the big idea is "Take a Stand"! Students will delve into reading with a focus on author's purpose, making inferences, fact and opinion, and problem/solution while they answer the following question: How can taking a stand change the way we see the world?

In math, classes will focus on strengthening their understanding of the number system and begin exploration of multiplication and division through arrays. Be sure to practice the multiplication facts!

On November 4th, our fourth graders will be visiting Old Sturbridge Village and become part of history as they journey back to rural New England. Observing early colonial life will enhance their study of the New England region. Our current topic in social studies is the United States, its land formations and its people. Students will discover that even though the United States is culturally diverse we all respect the ideas on which our country is based and respect the same laws.

Grade 5

Fifth grade students are reading, reading, reading. We are reading the Treasure's program and each class has begun or will begin book clubs. Students are using their Reader's Notebooks to record books they have read, books they want to read, new vocabulary words, and responses to questions about their independent reading. Students are also bringing their personal narratives to final copy as part of our writing program.

In math, fifth graders have been reading, writing, ordering, rounding, and multiplying big numbers and will begin a unit on fractions and ratios. Each class has learned about the US Constitution and has either begun a unit on light, sound, the senses, the stages of the moon or ancient cultures of the Americas. The fifth graders will begin their second rotation the week of October 10 in the science/social studies program.

Specials (Music)

In General Music Classes Grades 1-5 prepared a song, "School is Back in Session." They sang and moved with such great spirit at our PBIS Rally. First graders are experiencing formal music instruction for the first time. They are exploring different ways of using their voices and moving to the steady beat. Second graders are learning about rhythm patterns in 2/4 time and discovering those patterns in their songs. Third graders are preparing skills needed to play the Baroque recorder this year. Fourth graders are writing words to correlate with rhythm patterns in 6/8 time. Fifth graders are learning how to read and sing from a musical score.

This is an exciting year for Fifth Grade Rising Stars Chorus. Eighty-seven enthusiastic boys and girls signed up, breaking the record with 35 boys and 52 girls. Mark your calendars for their winter concert on January 18, 2012 and spring concert on May 31, 2012.



CURRICULUM counts!

Kindergarten

In October, kindergarteners are learning about autumn. We are learning about the weather as each season changes. Apples and pumpkins are part of this season. We have read about Johnny Appleseed and Christopher Columbus. There are also great fiction and nonfiction books about pumpkins. Fire safety lessons will be coming soon. We will meet firefighters and see all of the equipment that keeps us safe.

Grade 1

The first graders are doing a wonderful job adjusting to the full day routine!

In Language Arts, we have been reading about different themes. These have included "We Are Special", "Ready, Set, Move!", "Growing Up", "Pets", and "Teamwork". Weekly themes extend from the stories we are reading to writing, science and social studies.

In Science we have been working on the Scientific Method and the temperature. Students are collecting data each day throughout the month in order to graph the daily temperature of the air and water outside. We will analyze our results at the end of the month.

In math, we have covered several topics so far, including number sense, shapes, and addition. At home, students can practice writing tally marks and solving addition problems up to 10.

Grade 2

Second graders have done experiments using the scientific method. Miss Flynn did a model lesson using celery and food coloring to explain Capillary Action. Through careful observation and various investigations, students make predictions and watch to see how the results compare to their hypothesis.

This month the children will be reading stories about relationships in the Treasures reading anthology. We are very happy to be reading such interesting and motivating literature, informational articles, and poetry! Writing personal narratives is a recurrent theme in second grade.

In math, students are currently graphing, sorting, counting and estimating buttons. In the next unit, they'll be measuring their heights and arm lengths with colored links as a non-standard form of measurement. This data will be compiled and organized into a graph. Then students will be making predictions based upon this data. In this way, we are connecting mathematics and science to the real world.

Grade 3

The third graders are off to a busy start for the 2011-2012 school year! We are beginning our second unit of Treasures which includes main selections such as The Strongest One, which is a traditional Zuni play. Students will also read nonfiction selections including What's in Store for the Future? and The Planets in Our Solar System. During writing time in October, students will begin examining the characteristics of persuasive writing and will write their own persuasive piece.

In math, third graders will begin exploring multiplication. Our focus at this early stage is to develop a conceptual understanding of multiplication concepts and their use in solving problems. Students will begin learning strategies to solve multiplication problems and remembering how to solve basic multiplication facts.

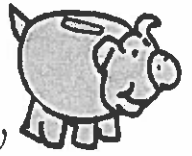
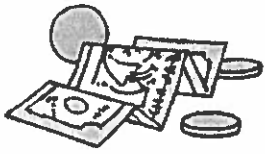
As stated at open house, PTO would not be able to accomplish our goals with out the support of volunteers – one hour really does make a huge contribution. Thank you for supporting PTO.
